## Diabetes in the Midlands. The Facts.





One in every 13 adults in the Midlands has diabetes. This is the highest prevalence of any region<sup>i</sup>



Obesity counts for as much as 85% of the overall risk of developing type 2 diabetes<sup>ii</sup>



Prevalence of type 2 diabetes is higher in areas of greater deprivation<sup>iii</sup>



Every week diabetes contributes to more than 2,100 cases of heart failure in England, including 420 cases in the Midlands<sup>iv,v</sup>



Every week diabetes contributes to more than 130 amputations in England, including 25 in the Midlands<sup>vi,vii</sup>



80% of NHS spend on diabetes goes on treating complications associated with diabetes<sup>viii</sup>



Improving diabetes control could lead to around £1.795bn productivity savings across the UK<sup>ix</sup>



Over the next 10 years, the Midlands Engine Observatory estimates that improving type 2 diabetes control could result in potential productivity savings of £269.25m in the Midlands<sup>x</sup>



It is estimated that there are up to 100,000 emergency callouts annually for hypoglycaemia (when blood sugar (glucose) level is lower than normal) in the UK, costing £13.6m per year to the NHS<sup>xi</sup>





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
